

## CAMDEN NEWS NOTES

\*\* Peter Koraczski, a young Pole, yesterday received a verdict of \$700 before Circuit Court Judge Cole as damages against the Dunn Oil Cloth Company for injuries received while employed by the corporation. He alleged that because of defective machinery he lost several fingers and the use of an arm.

\*\* Chief of Police Gravenor yesterday made Police Sergeant John Reader acting captain of the Second district, during the absence of Captain Arthur Stanley, who has gone abroad.

\*\* The American Biscuit Company was incorporated yesterday with a capital of \$10,000, the incorporators being Joseph Cotter, F. R. Hensell and John MacPeak. The Lukens & Whittington Company was also incorporated with the object of dealing and selling in dental and surgical instruments. The capital is \$125,000; incorporators, James Whittington, Mary Wallace Whittington, Weston C. Boyd, Charles Lower and William Ellis Coe.

\*\* Annie R. Smith, 70 years old, of 248 Pine street, fell on the pavement near her home yesterday. She fractured a hip and was taken to the Cooper Hospital.

\*\* James Leonard, David Robinson and Robert Robinson, all of Camden, were fined Wednesday night for creating a disturbance on a Mantua trolley car. The two former were fined \$10.85 and the latter \$15. The men gave the officers a lively chase between Mantua and Barnesboro.

\*\* Three years in the State prison at hard labor was the sentence given Edward Sands, a young negro, by Judge Joline in the Camden Criminal Court yesterday for stealing a horse and buggy from James Money, a young farmer, of Brooklyn, a small community in the lower part of the county. Sands was represented by Counsel Frederick Webb, jointly accused, who looked after his own case was discharged, it being shown he knew nothing about the theft. Alton Cleveland, a Kaighn avenue real estate man, against whom there are a number of indictments for embezzlement, pleaded non vult to one charge which was made against him by Charles Grosskopf. Sentence was deferred. Thomas Richards was fined \$50 on his pleading guilty to embezzling \$200 from a Philadelphia business house.

\*\* Hugh McManus, 55 years old, a bricklayer, of 1823 Roseberry street, Philadelphia, received probably fatal injuries yesterday when he fell with his scaffold from the third-story of the Manual Training and High School being erected on Chestnut street, near Eighth, Camden. He was taken to the Cooper Hospital. It is feared he has a compound fracture of the skull and other injuries.
