

SIX CAMDEN FIREMEN QUIT FOR BETTER JOBS

Higher Wages Lure Members of the Force to the Local Shipyard

High wages paid at shipyards is proving a big lure to the members of the Camden Fire Department, resignations of six laddies being presented to the Fire Committee of City Council yesterday by Chief Carter. The men quitting to become shipbuilders are Louis Neuman, George H. Parsglove, Roy De Haven, Julius Hubert, Harry W. Stone and Joseph Sparks. Their places were filled by the appointment of Robert Knox, Allen Palmer, Clarence Parsglove, Anthony Paradise, Harry B. Maxwell and Robert Welsh. Lieutenant Walter Mertz was made a captain to succeed Samuel Witzzell, deceased, and Horace Kerns was made a lieutenant. A contract was awarded to the American-La France Engine Company for a new motor engine. The price is \$10,000.

Draftees Leave on April 1

Originally scheduled to go to Camp Dix on Friday of next week, 453 Camden draftees will be at home for Easter. Under an order issued yesterday by Adjutant General K. Gilkyson, the departure of the men is delayed until April 1, when they will go to Wrightstown on a special train, leaving Camden at 9:20 A. M. The quota for the Camden city districts is as follows: First, 17; Second, 42; Third, 48; Fourth, 27. The First county district is to send 28 men and the Second county district 41.

Lad Killed by Auto Truck

Knocked down and run over by an automobile driven by Charles Dieser, of 1049 Kaighn avenue, seven-year-old Barney Skoli, of 1118 Chestnut street, died afterwards in the Homeopathic Hospital, Camden. His skull was fractured at the base and he is intensely injured. Dieser told the police he was proceeding slowly up Hadison avenue when at Park Boulevard the lad darted out from the sidewalk directly in the path of the car. Dieser was held.

Philadelphian Dies in Hospital

Taken ill in the Camden city prison on Sunday last, James Sinnala, aged 53 years, of 1628 North Bouvier street, Philadelphia, died yesterday in Cooper Hospital of uraemic poisoning. Sinnala was arrested in the Fifth ward on Saturday night while wandering around the streets. He was taken ill the following morning and in an unconscious condition was transferred to the hospital. He did not regain consciousness.

Plan Loan Parade

Camden is to have a big parade on the night of April 6 to mark the start of the third Liberty Loan drive, and it is planned to have a large detachment of soldiers from Camp Dix take part in the demonstration. Because of the lack of railway cars to transport the troops, it will be necessary to take them to and from camp by auto, and a committee has been named to organize a motor car brigade for this purpose. A detachment of League Island marines will be in the line, the National Guard Reserves will march and other organizations, lodges and clubs will be asked to take part. James Scott is chairman of the Parade Committee.
