

COLORED MAN BEQUEATHS \$10,000 FOR CHARITY

**Will of the Late Dempsey D. Butler,
of Camden, Probated**

The will of the late Dempsey D. Butler, of Camden, one of the richest colored persons in South Jersey, was admitted to probate by Surrogate West, in Camden, yesterday. The executors are Wilbur F. Rose, Edward C. Webster, Samuel H. Stiles, and John C. Lightfoote, Jr. The value of the estate is estimated at \$100,000. About \$10,000 is bequeathed for charity. The residue of the estate is left to relatives in New Jersey, Washington, D. C., Virginia, New York and Canada.

There is provision for the free burial in Butler's colored cemetery of all poor colored children who die in Camden during the next five years. The will also provides for the erection of a \$3000 hall at Kaighn avenue and Ann street, for Rising Sun Lodge of Colored Masons.

editor of the Mount Holly Mirror, who will be elected Printing Clerk of the House of Assembly. Editor Folwell was Engrossing Clerk last year. He was a candidate for the position of Supervisor of Bills, created by the act of 1890, doing away with the engrossing department, but was turned down by Governor Voorhees on the demand of Senator-elect McCarter, of Essex, that the office should be given to his candidate, Jesse R. Salmon. Mr. Folwell instigated a movement to have Attorney General Grey pass upon the constitutionality of the act creating the office of Supervisor, and it was knocked out. The result is that the Mount Holly editor will get his old position, under a new title, when the House of Assembly meets next week.
