

THE CELEBRATION.—The celebration of

the Fifteenth Amendment by the colored citizens of Camden and vicinity, yesterday, passed off in a quiet and orderly manner. There was no disturbance to mar the pleasant incidents of the day. At sunrise a salute was fired; at ten o'clock Divine services were performed in all the African churches, and at one o'clock the grand procession was formed on Broadway and Kalign's Point avenue. Chief Marshal, John H. Bean; Assistants, C. W. Robinson, O. L. Davis, H. Harrison, B. L. Masten.

As soon as the procession was formed, which was participated in by about two thousand persons, it moved in the following order—Chief Marshal and Aids; Excelsior Cornet Band, of Philadelphia; Military; Republican Associations of Fourth and seventh Wards, Philadelphia; Marshal and Aids of Second Division; Excelsior Band, of Woodbury; Republican Association of Woodbury; Omnibus containing little colored girls, dressed in white, representing the number of States which had voted in favor of the Amendment; Carriages containing civilians and invited guests; Drum Corps; South Camden Associations; Carriages; Centreville Brass Band; Centreville, Association; Carriages; Delegation from Newton township; Hannibal Band, of Philadelphia; Mount Holly Band and Delegation; Newton township Cavalry; Carriages. In one of these carriages was a colored man named John Hare, said to be in the 107th year of his age. He was regarded as a wonder.

In the evening a grand mass meeting was held in the Court House, which was organized by selecting the following officers:—
