

CLEARING THE MYSTERY.

Rumored Confession About the Murder of Baker Kalrer.

The mystery surrounding the murder of Baker William Kalrer has been solved. At least the Camden police authorities announced that such was the case yesterday afternoon, when they stated that Lavinia Moore, the woman with whom the burglar, Theodore Lambert, was living, had made a confession, in which she swore that Lambert had confessed to her that he murdered Kalrer.

Mrs. Moore resides at 1331 South Ninth street, and before his arrest Lambert resided with her. The woman says that on the morning of December 4 he came to her home greatly excited. Mrs. Moore says she looked at Lambert, who said he had just done a "job." He showed her a revolver and a gold watch. Mrs. Moore also says that a man named Joseph Stevens, of 1011 Locust street, was in the house and heard Lambert's story. The woman described the watch in detail, and the description tallies exactly with that of the timepiece stolen from the murdered man's house.

She also described the revolver and how Lambert hid it when about to be arrested. The woman also gave the names of two other persons who heard Lambert's statement.

Prosecutor Jenkins and his assistant, E. S. Ridgway, after getting the confession from the Moore woman, went to Lambert's cell and informed him of the confession.

It was rumored late last night that the accused murderer had broken down and made a confession.

Prosecutor Jenkins, Assistant Ridgway, Detectives Gallagher and McCormick and Lieutenant Smith held a consultation last evening and agreed to give nothing for publication to newspaper men until Thursday, when the case will go before the grand jury.
