

DEATH OF DR. G. T. ROBINSON.

Overwork Takes Off a Young Camden Physician.

Dr. George Taylor Robinson, of 318 Linden street, Camden, died yesterday of nervous prostration, caused by overwork. He was 34 years old.

Dr. Robinson was a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and also of Heidelberg. He was well known in Camden, where he resided for the past twenty years. He was pathologist at the Cooper Hospital. He was a member of Ionic Lodge, No. 94, F. and A. M.; Cyrene, Commandery, Knights Templar; Pottowottomie Tribe of Red Men, Sons of St. George, Knights of Golden Eagle, City and County Medical Society, Academy of Natural Sciences, Philadelphia, and several other societies. The funeral will take place on Monday, and will be private.

A FARMER KILLED BY LIGHTNING.

Struck Down in a Barn During Thursday Night's Storm.

CLAYTON, N. J., June 28—During the storm in this vicinity last night lightning played general havoc. A flash instantly killed Farmer Robert Dunn, who lived a mile west of this place. He and a young son were in the barn at the time. The same flash killed a horse, but strangely neither the boy nor horses in adjoining stalls were injured. Dunn was thrown fifty feet through an open door.

Four barns belonging to Patrick Mitchell, near here, were consumed by fire, the result of a stroke of lightning.

* Camden's Increased Population. *

Camden has a population of 63,340. The census is complete, with the exception of the Fifth ward, where the enumerator has to make some "call-backs." This may increase the result about 100. The population in 1880 was 41,650, and, owing to extensive building operations, when the last census was taken in 1890 it showed the population had increased to 58,813. The increase over the last census is 5033.

Trolley Wrecks a Dog Cart.

While driving across the tracks of the Camden Electric Railroad, near Collingswood, on Thursday night, John Atkinson, of 2015 Miller street, and Thornton Leightcap, of 680 Ferry avenue, Camden, were struck by a trolley car. Their dog cart was completely demolished, but the occupants escaped with slight injuries.
