

OVER IN JERSEY.

Notes and Items from the State Across the Delaware.

Jurors were drawn in the Camden county courts yesterday for the October term, forty eight being drawn for the first and sixty for the second term.

El H. Morgan, deputy county clerk of Camden county, who was charged by Joseph Wagner with having threatened to shoot him with a revolver, has produced affidavits to the effect that he had no revolver and did not assault Wagner. Two parties also made affidavit that Wagner told them he was to be paid to assault Morgan, before the affair occurred.

Operations were resumed in Collins & Son's glass factory at Tansboro on Monday.

Rev. P. P. Matzinger, who has been officiating in the Presbyterian churches at Waterford and Atco, has left the charge and returned to his studies at Princeton.

A tribe of the Independent Order of Red Men has been organized at Atco, with the following officers—Senior Hagamore—William C. Horn, Junior Hagamore—Charles McIlarg, Prophet—James Hand, Keeper of Wampum—Joseph W. Varnum, Keeper of Records—Charles Woodland.

The lease of the Sixth Regiment on its old armory expires on the 19th instant, and as the proprietor refused to make a temporary arrangement with the regiment, the belongings of the organization are being transferred to the new armory, which is now in a very incomplete condition.

Company I, Sixth Regiment, of Woodbury, has qualified twenty marksmen in practice at Manasquan range and will challenge Company F, First Regiment, N. G. P., of Philadelphia, which came off victorious in a team match at Manasquan. It will also challenge Gatling Gun Battery H, of Camden, which has qualified seventeen marksmen.

Justice W. H. Davis has held Robert Hopkins to \$200 bail on each of two charges of personating an officer and assault and battery. He has been acting as constable for Justice Price, of the Eighth ward.

Carroll C. Reeves, of Camden, is mentioned as a possible candidate for sheriff.

Henrietta Nuson was held to bail by Mayor Bradshaw yesterday, charged with assault and battery upon Catharine Thomas.

The third ward Republicans of Camden will hold a mass meeting to-morrow night.

C. W. Turnley, of Haddonfield, the first farmer to be arrested for violation of the ordinance recently passed compelling farmers to take out licenses for selling their produce in the streets of Camden, was rearrested by a policeman yesterday, but dismissed by the Chief of Police, who said that no more arrests will be made until the legality of the ordinance is tested. Mr. Turnley asserts that he will sue the policeman for assault and false arrest, and the city on the latter charge.
