CAMDEN MAY ENTERTAIN WATERWAYS DELEGATES

Mayor Asks That Visitors Be Given
Part of a Day to Inspect New
Jersey City's Industries

It is being planned by Mayor Ellis, of Camden, and committees of Council, the Board of Freeholders, the Board of Trade and a Citizens' Committee to contribute a share toward the entertainment of the delegates to the Atlantic Deeper Waterways Association, to be held in Philadelphia from September 12 to 15.

Mayor Ellis stated yesterday that to his surprise he learned that the Philadelphia members in charge of the arrangements had made no provision for Camden to entertain the 600 or more delegates. He told the committee that Camden expended over \$600 to send delegates to the association's convention, held last year in Savannah, Ga., and demanded that Camden be given at least a half day to entertain the delegates.

It is planned by Mayor Ellis and the committees to have the delegates come to Camden and inspect the industries for which the city is noted. The climax to the day's entertainment is expected to be a clam bake, or an open-air banquet.

To Confer With Shipyard Strikers

For the purpose of having a conference with the riveters, caulkers, reamers, chippers and drillers who are on strike at the plant of the New York Shipbuilding Company, Charles F. Scott, representing the International Brotherhood of Boilermakers' Iron Shipbuilders and Helpers of America, is in Camden. He is deputy organizer. The men demand an additional fifty cents for each one hundred rivets, and double time for Sundays and holidays. Their demand is not made in the name of any union. Mr. Scott said 1200 men are on strike at the shipyard.

Negro Who Shot Woman Caught

Arrested on a charge of firing three shots Friday night into the side of Annibel Williams, colored, 27 years old, 208 Spruce street, Ebenezer Phipps, a negro, 33 years old, 920 Locust street, was arrested in Camden yesterday by Detectives Brothers and Troncone. The police say they will make an example of Phipps to stop reckless use of firearms.

Two Hurt by Broken Bottles

Broken bottles in the street caused injuries to two persons in Camden yesterday. Thomas Kindall, 39 years old of Merchantville, fell on one at Twenty-fourth and Federal streets and sustained a lacerated scalp. James Herron, 14 years old, 902 North Fourth street, fell on another one at Third and York and cut his arm. Both were taken to Cooper Hospital.
