** Robert Smith, one of the Councilman's assistants in the recent recount of ballots, yesterday paid his share of the expenses of the recount—\$63.34.

** So far one hundred and ninety-five retail and twenty-seven wholesale applications for license to sell liquor the ensuing year have been filed with Licensor Clerk McCabe.
