Notes of Interest from the City Across the Delaware.

Samuel W. Semple, Chief Clerk and Cashier of the Internal Revenue office of the First district, has handed in his resignation to Collector Ferrell, by whom he was recently suspended for alleged irregularities in his accounts. A recent investigation disclosed a shortage of about \$300. This amount Mr. Semple made good. It is believed that the irregularities simply resulted from clerical and not intentional errors.

Officers Beudder and Peterson were tried before Mayor Pratt yesterday afternoon, the former for leaving his beat and the latter for refusing to make an arrest when requested to by a citizen. They were both found guilty and suspended from the force.

At a special session of the Camden Criminal Court yesterday Henrietta Jefferson was sentenced to six months' imprisonment for beating her husband. George Mayer, who was found guilty at a previous session of court of river piracy, was sentenced to two years in the State Prison.

Fred Schleaf, of No. 312 Pine street, was held in \$300 bail for court by Justice Davis yesterday, to answer the charge of deserting his family.

Frank Vincent, a very respectable and intelligent looking young man, was taken from the City Hall by the Sheriff of Pocomoke City, Md., yesterday back to that city where he is wanted to answer a criminal charge. Young Vincent is the son of the ex-postmaster of Pocomoke City.

Thomas Casper Hart was sworn in by Mayor Pratt yesterday as an officer to take the place of Officer Peterson, suspended.
