Events in Camden and Various Sections of the Environs.

The Camden, Gloucester and Mount Ephraim Narrow Gauge Railway Company contemplate running their trains on Sundays as soon as necessary repairs can be made, which, it is anticipated, can be accomplished in one month. The citizens of Gloucester City are anxious to have this accommodation.

The Camden police force, for the year ending March 31, made 1061 arrests, as follows. Drunk and disorderly, 671; disorderly conduct, 97; assault and battery, 105, grand larceny, 21, petty larceny, 47; breaking and entering 4; malicious mischief, 10; violating city ordinances, 23; policy dealing, 6; improper conduct, 10, perjury, 4; disorderly houses, 6; runaways, 12, fugitives, 7; demented, 13, refused to pay fare on cars, 6.
