NO ROOM FOR REFORMERS

City Bonds Break the Premium Rec-
ord—More Sheet Asphalt Street
Paving Ordered

Camden City Council gave a general shaking-up to city employes last evening, when over a score of ordinances were passed to fill positions in various departments. Some of the incumbents were re-appointed and several Republicans who had been ousted last spring by the reformers were reinstated. A few new appointments were made. The Republican Councilmen discussed on the appointments for an hour before the regular meeting of Council. Council confirmed the action of the Finance Committee in disposing of \$50,000 worth of 4 per cent. thirty-year repaving bonds to Lampbreck & Company, of New York city, for \$115.94. The premium will amount to \$7970, and is said to be the highest bonus ever realized by the city from the sale of bonds.

A communication from H. G. Morse, president of the New York Shipbuilding Company, expressed appreciation of the businesslike action of City Council in offering inducements to the company to locate in Camden. It further stated that should the site be selected the company would be pleased to locate there. A resolution was adopted directing the city clerk to communicate with the company and state that should any further legislation be desired Council stood ready to consider the matter.

An ordinance was passed to pave Fifth street, from Bridge avenue to Chestnut street, with sheet asphalt. Council adjourned until April 20.
