## CAMDEN AIMS TO END OVERHEAD WIRE DANGER

### Ordinance Recommended Calling Upon Telegraph Companies to Act

In following out the suggestions of Mayor Ellis, Camden Council's Street Committee has recommended the adoption of an ordinance requiring the Western Union and the Postal Telegraph Companies to remove their wires from Market, Arch and Federal streets between the Delaware and Cooper Rivers, and on Broadway from Market street to Kaighn avenue. It is stipulated that the wires must be placed underground, a civic betterment at which the Mayor has been aiming for many years. The Public Service Corporation has already started to bury its wires.

Another ordinance in this connection will be sent to Council providing that all trolley poles be of concrete, steel or iron, thus doing away with the wooden poles and averting such an accident as occurred several weeks since when a Berlin woman was killed by the collapse of a rotted trolley pole at Eighth and Sycamore streets.

Declared to have swindled grocers of this city and Camden out of several thousand dollars, Alfredo Guglielmo, alias Alfred Williams, 29 years old, who says he is from Port Reading, N. J., was arrested by Detective Troneone in Camden yesterday. Guglielmo represented himself to be an agent of "Rome Importing & Supply Company" and took orders with the understanding that 25 per cent must be paid in advance. He then disappeared, it is charged. He is said to have confessed.

### Finds Wife After Five Years

A search for the past five years by Pacifico Biondi, of Bridgeport, Conn., was rewarded yesterday in his locating his runaway wife, Mrs Gaetano Biondi, and Charles Petri, both of whom were living at West Berlin, Camden county. The husband caused the arrest of the two and they were held in bail by Justice Schmitz on a charge of misdemeanor. Five years ago the woman disappeared. The husband learned of her whereabouts a few days ago and lost no time in going to the town.

### Sons of Veterans to Form New Camp

A meeting of sons and grandsons of Civil War veterans will be held tonight at Post 5, G. A. R. Hall, in Camden, for the purpose of organizing a new camp of the Sons of Veterans.
